to be seen, nothing but water, the raven would not go back to Noah, but went flying about, resting outside the ark.

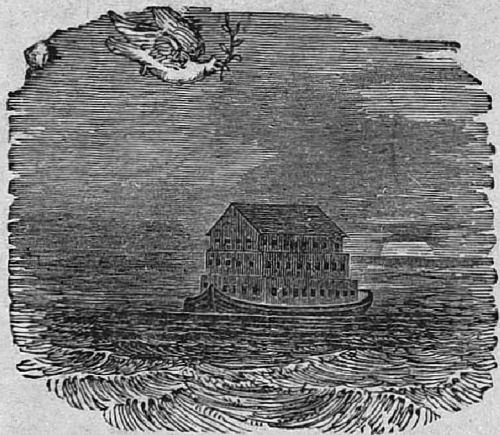


When Noah saw that the raven did not return, he went again among his birds, and chose a dove. The gentle little dove saw no-

She did not stay, but plucked off a leaf with her beak, and came back to Noah.

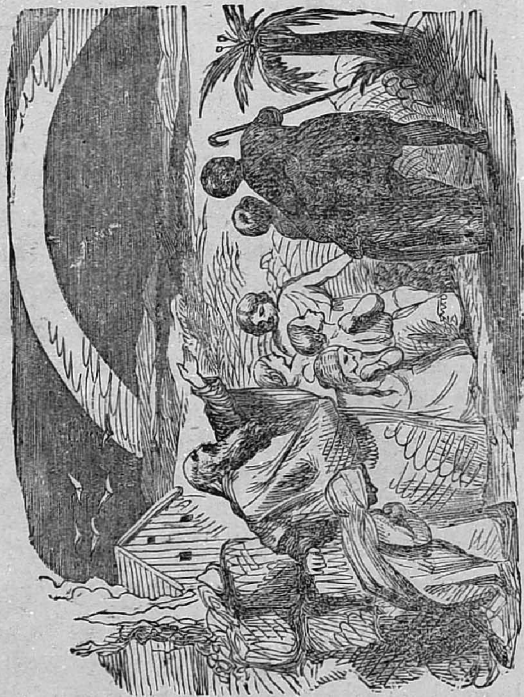
Noah kept the dove one week
