*[Previous portions up to paragraph 35 lost.]*

. . . Doll<sup>r</sup>: 4640 advised of in yours of the 8<sup>th</sup>: of Novem<sup>r</sup>[b<sup>r</sup>:] last  $\text{P}$  Ship Sarum and Doll<sup>r</sup>: 8138 advised in your Letter 28 March last  $\text{P}$  the Josiah Ketch but here is a bill presented to us dated 28 March past for Doll<sup>r</sup>: 442 payable to M<sup>r</sup>: Collier of which you have not advised, yet nevertheless wee have p<sup>d</sup>: it, knowing it to be your Bill, concerning which [advise] in your next.

36. Wee should have now enlarged on severall particulars but that the Company have in a great measure anticipated us in this Letter by the Josia and Mary, Copy of which comes Inclosed, to which wee refer you, wherin you will find that the Comp<sup>a</sup>: have remitted halfe penny of the penny  $\text{P}$  Pound on Pepper for Permission and that they stenuously press the makeing of White Pepper and that you will incourage cultivateing pepper in Gennera[1] so that they may never fail of full ships and quick returns w<sup>th</sup>: [out] which 'tis impossible they can bear the great[charge] they Likewise press the incouraging chinese to Inhabitt with you and wonder they should not Choose rather to live under an English Govern<sup>or</sup>:] than a Duch.

37. The Comp<sup>a</sup>: affairs of late have been [in] great troubles in all Parts of India under [ . . . ] of the Pyrats, takeing severall Surrat Ships and cheiffy stirrd up by S<sup>r</sup>: William [Nor]ris who has been at the Kings Camp but got no Phirmaund notwithstanding he has spent [ . . . ] y<sup>t</sup>: they [ . . . ] S<sup>r</sup>: John Gayer and lately our Factoryes has been blockd up, so that no Provisions nor nothing elce could goe in or out, our Godowns Broak open, out of which they have taken to the value of about two hundred Thou<sup>sn</sup><sup>d</sup>:] rupees, and our Masters Estates seized up in the country: the same has been done to the Dutch but by late advices, our People in the Factory are all att Liberty, except S<sup>r</sup>: John Gayer and the President, This place and Fort S<sup>t</sup>: Davids, was besieged from the beginning of Feb<sup>r</sup>: to the third of May, and all trade and Provisiion interdicted when they withdrew their forces upon an agreem<sup>t</sup>: made with them which to this day is not [fulfilled nor] have they as yett taken off the stop they put upon our Masters Estate in the Country, nor redelivered the goods they seized w<sup>ch</sup>: lye at S<sup>t</sup>: Thomas, wee are Likewise advised that the same troubles are in Bengall, there being a Generall order Issued out by the King for the same, copy of which comes Inclos<sup>d</sup>.

38. M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben left England in October last, being bound for China, butt called here, who [acquaints] us that there was a great propability of a warr with France, Portugall, and Spaine, as also of a Union between the two Comp<sup>a</sup>: there came out another Ship called the Orenseb both belonging to our Masters, and under his direction.

Grass seed :

39. By some that are lately come from your Parts wee are informed that whereas your soyle is very [fertile and] produces good Grass of which desire you wo<sup>d</sup>: procure good store of seed, extraordinary yett dryed, and send it us over by all Oppertunitys, and lett the seed be of the finest and best sort of grass, which will be of great Service to us here.

40. By reason of our troubles wee dispatcht not the Bedford till y<sup>e</sup>. ninth of March who tooke in 20 [ ] bales of Goods, her Cargoe amounting Pag<sup>t</sup>: 291276 [85f.]; the Hampshire arrived here from China the 24<sup>th</sup>: Feb: last, and the Loyall Cooke the 11<sup>th</sup>: Instant, on which is Gabriel Roberts Esq<sup>r</sup>: by the Companys order Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>: of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: Davids and Second of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: George.

41. Cap<sup>m</sup>: Phrip meeting with a bill of yours at Padang Amots: 1776.3.1 in the hands of one Rean[ . . . ] being for [Sheniamin] you bought of him he satisf[ie]d the said bill and brought it hither which wee have taken up and paid, and order you to Credit us for the same.

42. Wee have on this Vessell sent you 2,000 Rupees and some liquors, as ¶ Invoice and bill Loading inclosed amounting Pag<sup>t</sup>: 773: 6: 4.

43. M<sup>r</sup>: Edmund Bugden takes his passage on this Vessell whose post is apointed third of Bencoolen as mentioned in the 7<sup>th</sup>: Paragraph of this Letter.

July 9<sup>th</sup>:

44. The primo Instant the Phoenix from Persia arrived, where Cap<sup>m</sup>: Lambert dyed, M<sup>r</sup>: Bruce writes us from Gombroone that just at the ships departure they had receivd fresh advices from Constantinople, that the two Companys were united about the 20 Jan<sup>r</sup>: [ . . . ] which time [ . . . ] tho' every day expected, the Parliament desolv'd and a new one Elected, who had past a bill of Attainder against the pretended Prince of Wales for takeing the Title of King of England, and who has promissed the King to grant him such sup'lys to enable him to give such aids to the Emperour, that by the force of his Armes he may recover his Spanish rights. The latter news is confirmed by two French ships who arrived at Pollicierry few days past, and are bound for Bengall, they left France the latter end of Feb<sup>r</sup>: our style when no warr as before mentioned.

45. Inclosed comes our Account Currant and Journall parcells taken from our [Books RRSS and T.T.] commencing May 1698 Ending Aprill, 1701 [and] are sent in [order to] adjusting Accounts between your place and ours, but if you dont bring up your bookes, all this is in vain. We are.

Wee expected this ship wo<sup>d</sup>: have sailed Long ere this, so that since writing the foregoing wee have to advise the arrivall of ship London 23 Instant w<sup>ch</sup>: belongs to the Sperate stock [ . . . ] who left the [Downes] the 4<sup>th</sup>: of March, and confirms to us the Europe news before written at which time there was no proclamation of Warr butt all ready in order to it: and also Confirms to us the union of the two companys and gave us the Copy of the papers Inclosed to w<sup>ch</sup>: wee refer you: he also informes

us of the Colechester and Wentworth bound out for this Coast and Pray on our Master[s] Acco<sup>t</sup>: who wee daily expect w<sup>n</sup>: wee shall be thoroughly informed of all matters at home and by next opportunity shall advise you thereof. Wee are

S<sup>rs</sup>:

Wee have received yours of 13<sup>th</sup>: November by the Sarum, and yours of 21<sup>st</sup>: March last by the Josiah Ketch, in the former you mentiond you took ashoar the Chest of fanams, and what stores elce you wanted, which had you particularised it wo<sup>d</sup>: have been some direction to us how to have [furnisht] you for the future.

By this conveyance there was no possibility of sending you supplys of men, but by the Sarum, and w<sup>t</sup>: other ships come to your Parts wee'l send you wht: wee can spare, or procure.

Wee hope to hear that you have effected that good design of bringing the pepper overland from Ire Dicket since the barr is so very hazardous, that 'tis not to be done by boats.

Wee observe what you write about fannams, with which wee intend to supply you by the next ship.

Wee have paid your bill for Doll<sup>r</sup>: 1900, advised of in your Letter 13 November and for Doll<sup>r</sup>: 412: 4 advised in your Letter 21<sup>st</sup>: March last.

Wee approve of the order you have from the Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>: &c: in relation to your building at Bantall, and that the raising the foundation thereof will certainly very much contribute to healthfulness of your people.

Wee wait the effect of your bitchar, about the fanams and Coppar Cash, w<sup>ch</sup>: will direct us in our future supplies to you. We are.

Few days after our writeing the foregoing wee saw a probability of accommodateing matters with the Nabob so detained the Pacquet that wee might advise you of the same, & that our Letters might come the securer (they haveing intercepted Severall) so that after severall proposalls, wee came to an agreem<sup>t</sup>: on the third of May, the particularrs of which is in a paper, a part to which wee referr you and was the [re in] hopes they wo<sup>d</sup>: have soon complied, that wee might advise you of it, but they delaid from day to day and did not take of the restraint on our Masters Trade till few dayes past, when they sent us Chubdars w<sup>th</sup>: Dustick in order thereto, Translate of w<sup>ch</sup>: comes Inclosed thô on the third of May as before mentioned, they withdrew their forces w<sup>ch</sup>: lay round us, and Provisions came in as formerly and all Trade free except the Companys, w<sup>ch</sup>: [ . . . ] [officers] that came with the Dusticks, are now cerving them in the Country w[h]ere our goods are stopt, the effect of which wee shall soon know for that as yett wee have no goods come in, nor are those delivered that were seized at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma, nor have we paid them one penny of mony.

By the Copyes of the Bengall Letters w<sup>ch</sup>: wee here transmit you will perceive the troubles have reached them which doubtless they have advised you from thence: we have sent them what assistance we were capable of, and what they desired, and imediately returned them their Mary Smack w<sup>th</sup>: mony, Gunners and amunition & on the 14<sup>th</sup>: June last sailed the Ship Hampshire thither, and Little before and since severall other vessells of this Place, so that they must be in a tollerable Condition to withstand the insolencys of those people.

The 11<sup>th</sup>: June the Loyall Cooke arrivd here from China, on w<sup>ch</sup>: is Gabriell Roberts Esq<sup>r</sup>: who the Company have orderd to be 2<sup>d</sup>: of this place & Deputy Governour of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: Davids, the Cargoe brought hither, consist Cheify of Gold & Copper & some Quick Silver, which wee shall dispose of here: Raw silk, wraught Silk & some Tea wee design for England on the first Ship: Gold was very scarce which Obliged y<sup>m</sup>: to leave behind [twenty] thousand four Hundred Tale, which wee hope may come upon M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben.

The Phoenix arrived here from Persia y<sup>o</sup>: primo Instant, where the Cap<sup>n</sup>: and Supra Cargoe an Armenian dyed, of which Doubtless you have been advised, as also of the news they bring of the Union of the two Comp<sup>as</sup>: and no warr declared in January, which is confirmed by two French Ships who arrived at Pollichery the first Instant and left France the latter end of Feb<sup>r</sup>y: The Anna arrived in England the 27<sup>th</sup>: of November, & soon after they expecting the arrivall of the King William, Madras and Mountigue, Wee have also advices from the Cape that the Dutches gott safe there the beginning of Jan<sup>r</sup>y: where after she had refresht her men, sailed directly for England.

Here are no Ships of our Masters as yett arrived upon this Coast, nor of the New Comp<sup>a</sup>: which make us belevie they are detained either by a Generall Embargo, or on Account of the Union.

If no unforeseen accident prevent, we hope to dispatch the Loyall Cooke and Hampshire in Sep<sup>m</sup>: We are

Hon<sup>rd</sup>: S<sup>r</sup>:

Just after closing the accompanying Pacq<sup>t</sup>: we rec<sup>d</sup>: yours of the 8 of May and 23 D<sup>o</sup>: signed by the Generall, and having so fully wrote you in ours of the 28<sup>th</sup>: Aprill and 16 July last, we have little more to add save to acknowledge the receipt thereof [ . . . ] before, the former of the 8 of May came not to our Hands.



The Padre Miss<sup>r</sup>. informed you as to any action between us and Dowd Cawn for that they never wo<sup>d</sup>: adventure to come within our reach, thò they threatned hard, and [do?] still; as to our Vacuell at Court, we have no better opinion of him then you have, nor of yours neither, and w<sup>n</sup>: we sent a Petition to the King, Assid Cawn and his son wee remitted him One thousand rupees, and yett the fellow had the Impudence, who did say to write to us for 6 or 7,000 Rupees to inable him, to deliver the Petition to the King and Letters, and writes us plainly that without expending great summs of mony there is no justice for us in the Contry, and from our own Experience wee may say, throwing of money into the sea, is to as much purpose as sending anybody to Court for redress of greivances where there is nothing but vast Expençe, and Villany, and wee beleive you can confirm [ . . . ] to have sent for our Vacueel down resolveing [ . . . ] more Expençe.

By way of Persia the President receivd a Letter from M<sup>r</sup>: ffeetwood Consul at Grand Cairo relateing to the bussiness of Mess<sup>rs</sup>: Wheeler, and Cockroft, copy of w<sup>ch</sup>: comes inclosed to w<sup>ch</sup>: wee referr you and wee thank you for forwarding the Letters relating to that matter.

Wee hope y<sup>e</sup>: Loyall Bliss and Nathaniel mett with better success in their Passage to Persia than y<sup>e</sup>: Susanna who wee hear is at Galley.

Wee are glad to hear of the Dispatch of the Martha and Hearne.

We [ . . . ] that S<sup>r</sup>: Nicholas is Broa [ . . . ] was left in Pawn, and hope they have levyd that [ . . . ] upon them before the confirmation of the Union.

The Difference between S<sup>r</sup>: William and S<sup>r</sup>: Nicholas was no more then what wee expected when they both drove on to ruin the trade, and [ . . . ] no regard but to their particularr Interest, the [ . . . ] haveing clashed with all in severall respects [ . . . ] under a Colour of Promoteing their Masters Affa[irs.]

Tricks S<sup>r</sup>: Nicholas has playd with [the] pretty Neise Beatrix wee wait to hear how the[y] are sensured, or encouraged from those of his own Cast at home with what [anathemass or Applauses] will happen to him thereupon.

The Bengall Merc<sup>t</sup>: toucht at this Port 18<sup>th</sup>: June last Purar brought only some [ . . . ] ashore from M<sup>r</sup>: Proley, [who] gave a very [ . . . ] Character of S<sup>r</sup>: Nicholass's management [ . . . ] not a word of his own Commad<sup>r</sup>: who we [ . . . ] wee wished S<sup>r</sup>: Nicholas [ . . . ] Letters that S<sup>r</sup>: William was takeing his passage on the Scipio for England and that they intended to touch at Bombay where you say he waterd, Whereas had he come hither he should not have had a drop to have cooled his tongue, and doubtless the warlike stores that ship spar'd the Arabs, must of necessity be resented by the Persians, who can revenge themselves on no English but what belongs to our Masters, without they are timely advised, that so they may seize some of the new Comp<sup>a</sup>: people belonging to [the ships] that go to Gombroon.

Wee observe the great favour procured you by the Interest of the Govern<sup>r</sup>: of Surat and shall be glad to hear that they are performed.

If the speaker Pyrate went of the Coast of India as you are advised from Callicutt and [ . . . ] 'tis much to be feard he will be in the Streights of Malacca this year we haveing no ships this year, gone to China but such tools as must needs become a prey to any Pyrate thò never of so inconsiderate a Force.

Wee must continue our Application to you for a yearly supply of new garden seeds, and wheat: the latter we receivd none this year tho there was a Quantity came upon a ship called the Adventure consignd to M<sup>r</sup>: Thomson who is lately dead he would have taken advantage of our great necessitys and askd no less then 200 Pag<sup>r</sup>: Garce but as providence orderd it here soon after touchd a Portugueze Ship at S<sup>t</sup>: Thoma who came from Demain and spared what we wanted at 91 Pag<sup>r</sup>: ¶ Garce We think it hard that one ffactory can't supply the other at the best hand when so many oppertunities of Shipping [prevail] and that we are in one Interest.



Wee hear this day from Batavia that the Aurengzeb had toucht there in her way to China and that M<sup>r</sup>: Catchpole, and M<sup>r</sup>: Loyd were also there from which wee infer that that noble Settlement at Chusan is at an end tho as M<sup>r</sup>: Dolben told us they in England equalld it w<sup>th</sup>: all the Settlements of our Masters in India.

S<sup>rs</sup>:

Wee last night rec<sup>d</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: of the 10<sup>th</sup>: and 18<sup>th</sup>: Instant, the former adviseing of your drawing a bill upon us for Pag<sup>s</sup>: 1451: 26 which is complied with and the latter advising that you had made the Contract which we ordered in ours of the 7<sup>th</sup>: Ins<sup>t</sup>: by the Sarum, but you have not regarded our order in the amo<sup>t</sup>: thereof, nor in the sorts of Goods, for which you deserve the severest Checks, and no less then all [ . . . ] the Comp<sup>as</sup>: service, for what reprehensions must we expect from them when we not onely dont send them such goods as they order, but such as they strictly forbid and therefore wee auull the Contract you have lately made and possitively Command you upon receipt of this that you agree for no other sorts of goods then w<sup>t</sup>: the Comp<sup>a</sup>: have ordered in a list formerly sent you, wherein you are to observe that whereas they mention some goods that turn to little or no account yet [as] being willing [to keep] up the fabrike they order a small quantity in that large Investment, which in our Investments be proportiond and therefore 'tis our reittered orders to you that you meddle not w<sup>th</sup>: a peice of Goods, that the Comp<sup>a</sup>: has prohibited to be sent them. There is the Brampore Chint which are forbid in the List of Goods, but ordered to be sent them in a following Letter by that Shipping, which goods may stand as they do in your Contract but no other that the comp<sup>a</sup>: has forbidden.

In regard that otherwise wee must send down mony, we have paid yo<sup>r</sup>: bill for four Thous<sup>d</sup>: Pag<sup>s</sup>: but let not this be a President hereafter for you or any subordinate Factoryes to draw on us without first obtaining leave for the same.

Wee have receiv<sup>d</sup>: the List of goods you have in the Warehouse w<sup>ch</sup>: had you compared with the List of goods the Comp<sup>a</sup>: ordered you might have seen you had sufficiently transgrest in those without making so great an addition as you have done in your Contract.

M<sup>r</sup>: Pearson has leave to Come up hither by the first oppertunity for recovery of his health.

Wee here returne you your Peons, and shall write you in a day or two by boat.

This ship left the Downs the 4 March when no Warr Proclaimed but daily expected.

Our last to you was y<sup>e</sup>: 9<sup>th</sup>: past, Copy of w<sup>ch</sup>: comes Inclosed since w<sup>ch</sup>: wee have rec<sup>d</sup>: yours of the 23<sup>d</sup>: May and 6<sup>th</sup>: June the 30<sup>th</sup>: [ . . . ]

The purport of w<sup>ch</sup>: Cheifly advising the great hopes you have that your troubles are ov[er] for that in the subordinary Factoryes they were not so severe as at first, as also your admiration that wee sent you no more Siccas on the Mary Bowyeas, when we had no more ready coined, and you representing your condition so deployable for want of mony to supply the urgent expences of your factory, we thought it very necessary to hasten her to [ . . . ] then you writing so earnestly for Europe Ships, men & c<sup>a</sup>: to be sent to your assistances and likewise acquainting us the Moors was raising forces to come [against] you, and had put in one thousand men, and were mounting the Guns in Tauna Fort, and erecting another Fort on your side [ . . . ] all w<sup>ch</sup>: considered, we could not think it adviseable in us to send you more of the Companyes Estate then what necessary to defray Charges till wee heard further from you, nor did you in your former Letters write us that you had Goods in your Godowns for which you wanted money to pay for them, which had wee known we would have supplied you by the Hampshire who might for their security have taken in the goods thô now upon the union hope they may be bought again at farr Cheaper rates then formerly.

Here arrived 23<sup>d</sup>: past. the London Cap<sup>tn</sup>: Mathews by whom the Letter Comes. He Left the Downs 4<sup>th</sup>: of March, and confirms the news to us of the two Comp<sup>a</sup>: . Uniteing, the paper relating to which comes inclosed, their [was] no warr Proclaimed but daily expected, and great preparation made in order theirt.

He tells us he left in the Downs the Colechester and Wentworth our Masters Ship bound for the Coast and Bay, the Norris and Tankerfeild on the new Comp<sup>a</sup>: account w<sup>ch</sup>: ships past by when he was at Madras, so that wee hourly expect them, when shall immediatly dispatch one of them to you with one hundred and thirty Rupees, and one Thousand Chests of Coppar, but if they dont arrive in few days, [wee] shall then send it on the Phoenix, who wee [should] not detain here but for necessity of settling matters between the men and Officers, thô haveing been a very distracted Ship ever since the Death of Cap<sup>tn</sup>: Lambert, and at Last we must recommend her to you to procure for her if Possible a freight for Persia or Mocho, for wee know not how we shall provide for her thô these matters will be better considered after the arrivall of our shipping.

Wee observe what you write of the arrivall of Seven Surrat Ships, and what more expected, one of w<sup>ch</sup>: is lost upon Due Peon't and wonder you had no Letters from S<sup>r</sup>: Jn<sup>o</sup>: Gayer by them; for that since we last wrote you we receiv'd one [copy] of which comes inclosed by which you Perceive that matters are not throughly settled there, nor are they here which makes us jealous, that there is something more designed against us for they have not to this day ask't for a Rupee of what wee [agreed] for.

This Ship also brings us the good news of the arrivall of Ship King William w<sup>ch</sup>: was the latter [end] of January or beginning of February.

The Silk Worms you sent us thrive here extraordinary well, and hope may answer the end, we meet with no obstruction at present, but the want of Mullberry trees (w<sup>t</sup>: wee are planting in great numbers) and people to winde off the silk, of whom wee desire you will send 6 or 8 persons for this place and Fort S<sup>t</sup>: Davids, for there is but one of those you sent us knowing anything of it, and he not so dexterous as he ought to bee.

In the time of our troubles here when we sent the Sarum as a [guard ship to lye] at Fort S<sup>t</sup>: Davids wee put on board her one hundred ninety one piggs and three slabs of lead, which was omitted in her Invoice, we desire you if you take it on shore you'll weigh it and Credit us for the same and advise the weight thereof ¶ first opportunity. Gov<sup>r</sup>: of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David wh<sup>ch</sup>: he is [to Publish] on his arrivall to all the Comp: Servants Civill & Military, who

wee Injoyn & Command to observe the same, & Particularly recommend to yo<sup>r</sup>: Consideration the following heads, not doubting in the least but that you Gentlemen of the Councill who have long resided on the Place will Thoroughly inform the now Dep. Gov<sup>r</sup>: the Present Circumstances of all the Comp<sup>a</sup>: affairs, and give yo<sup>r</sup>: best assistance and advice for the future well-being thereof and this wee strictly require you as an Incumb<sup>t</sup>: duty on you.

1. Wee recommend to you the Care of the Investments, of w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>t</sup>: here have very much Complained of and th<sup>o</sup> yo<sup>r</sup>: Place is better situated than this for the Providing of Cloth; yet Considering the Price and goodness of ours here, have Come out hitherto much Cheaper than yours w<sup>ch</sup>: wee hope by the future Care of the new Dep. Gov<sup>r</sup>: twill be effectually remedied and Whereas last year by the dearness of Cotton w<sup>ch</sup>: was from 18 to 20 Pag<sup>s</sup>: ̄ Candy, and now att 14, as also by means of many & great Contracts made by all European nations, wee were forced to advance Six ̄ Cent w<sup>ch</sup>: wee hope now the Merch<sup>ts</sup>: will abate, Cotton being 20 to 25 ̄ C<sup>t</sup>: Cheaper w<sup>ch</sup>: does now Incourage us to order an Investm<sup>t</sup>: to be made in yo<sup>r</sup>: Place for one hundred Thousand Pag<sup>s</sup>: according to the List y<sup>t</sup>: Comes herew<sup>th</sup>: and to enable you to Contract for the same wee lade on this ship [the] Loyall Cooke Thirty Thousand Pagodas and other stores as ̄ Invoice & Bill of loading Inclosed, so desire you to hasten y<sup>e</sup>: same y<sup>t</sup>: wee may not want a good Cargo for y<sup>e</sup>: January Ship and wee must not omit to recommend to yo<sup>r</sup>: Care the well sorting, washing & Packing of all yo<sup>r</sup>: goods.

2<sup>y</sup>: Wee recommend to you the increasing and y<sup>e</sup>: exact Collecting of the Comp<sup>a</sup>: revenues but let itt be in such manner, as may rather Increase than decrease or drive away the Inhabitants.

3<sup>th</sup>: You are all very sensible of the greatt losses & Charges the Comp<sup>a</sup>: have been at in these Parts, by means of y<sup>e</sup>: late troubles so that as [ . . . ] help to regain the same wee must desire you to be very thrifty in all sorts of Expences but not in such a manner as to be Prejudicial to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: honour or Interest and where the Generall Table was taken away in M<sup>r</sup>: Frasers time, wee leave it to yo<sup>r</sup>: Prudence to reestablish the same, or keep them a [ . . . ] and if the former, wee doubt not, but that y<sup>e</sup>: Dep: Gov<sup>r</sup>: will take a Particular Care that itt may be managed with all y<sup>e</sup>: good husbandry immaginable, the monthly expence of which all Included wee order to be remitted hither.

4<sup>th</sup>: Wee have sent you on this ship some silk worms (under the Care of a fellow from Bengall and two others that have been Instructed in this place their wages as ̄ Paymasters list inclosed) of w<sup>ch</sup>: wee desire yo<sup>r</sup>: uttmost Care & Industry, to Promote and Incourage the making of Silk, wee doing the same here and find no manner of obstruction, but the want of Mullberry trees w<sup>ch</sup>: wee are daily Planting and hope notwithstanding the barrenness of our soil t<sup>w</sup>ill answer the end, and if so [there] can be no doubt twill be much easier effected in yo<sup>r</sup>: Parts yo<sup>r</sup>: soil being so much better, wee have sent to Bengall for People to wind off the Silk and shall send some of y<sup>m</sup>: to you, so soon as they arrive.

5<sup>th</sup>: Wee are very sensible of the ill accommodation the Company have for their [ . . . ] and more Particularly att Cuddalore, which Place is of the greatest Consequence to them and [y<sup>e</sup>:] Merchants Chiefly resideing there and [it being] the Place of trade in those Parts so though [we] don't injoyn the Dep. Gov<sup>r</sup>: to reside there yett wee desire that he will frequently visit and incourage the Inhabitants thereof, and whereas the Comp<sup>a</sup>: have no Factory fitting for the Dep. Gov<sup>r</sup>: to live in it being so very much run to decay and out of repair, and the situation of it being so ill and Inconvenient that wee Can't think itt advisable to bee att the Charge of fitting itt up, but there is a house and ground of [M<sup>r</sup>: Haynes's] w<sup>ch</sup>: stands very convenient near the river and upon the highest ground in y<sup>e</sup>: Town, so that in time w<sup>ch</sup>: some addition it might be made a very Convenient Cittadell, there being a necessity of having one, the Town being for the most Part of it well fortified, for w<sup>ch</sup>: reason there [must] be as many or more of y<sup>e</sup>: Military [sepoys at] Cuddalore then Tevenapatam, so wee leave itt to you the Dep. Gov<sup>r</sup>: & Councill to treat w<sup>th</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Haynes for his house & ground, if you find it of service to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: and advise us thereof.

8. Wee also desire a frequent Correspondence w<sup>th</sup>: you, and that nothing of moment [happ<sup>as</sup>:] but that you give us early & speedy advices thereof.

9. Wee desire that it may be a standing order that the Warehousekeep<sup>rs</sup>: delivers in an acco<sup>tt</sup>: every month of what goods for Europe he has in y<sup>e</sup>: Warehouse and that you remitt itt us.

10. In our Generall Letter from the Comp by M<sup>r</sup>: Roberts wee rec<sup>d</sup>: the following Clauses Viz<sup>t</sup>: Whatsoever Goods, Merchandize or Commodities they or any others in the ship bring to the Fort must pay you, for our Accompt ten Ɔ Cent on the full value thereof, besides, Freight, Custom, and incident charges, and must be accordingly deducted out of the Commission, if belonging to any of the four and if to any others out of the amount of their Goods, which you are to observe & Collect the dutys mention'd therein upon all China goods w<sup>ch</sup>: shall be landed out of the Loyall Cooke and return us an account thereof that so wee may remitt the same to the Comp:

Wee desire you to load on the Loyall Cooke what bales of the Comp<sup>as</sup>: are ready and if not all wash't you may pack up some ordinary brown Longcloth & Sallampores, and likewise send all the goods belonging to our Merchants here and dispatch her to us w<sup>th</sup>: all Expedition.

The Presid<sup>t</sup>: complains of yo<sup>r</sup>: Injustice to the Elizabeth Brigantine who being in distress landed her goods at yo<sup>r</sup>: Port, for w<sup>ch</sup>: you make them pay Custom the good part of it ship't off again, for w<sup>ch</sup>: t'is order'd that you return the Custom [to the] Presid<sup>t</sup>: here. Wee are.

Wee have sev<sup>ll</sup>: of yours before us unanswered which wee deferred by reason wee were in daily Expectation of the Europe Ships which as yett not arriving, wee have resolved to dispatch hence the Loyall Cooke on Tuesday [next] on w<sup>ch</sup>: is Gab: Roberts Esq<sup>r</sup>: Dep: Govern<sup>r</sup>: of yo<sup>r</sup>: Place.



Wee wish you could in the return of the ship hither Contrive to gett the march off from Boomypollam, and the firewood too provided there be no white ants in it, both w<sup>ch</sup>: wee extremely want here and the former not Procurable att any rate, and for the wood if it comes not by the ship, pray find out some Conveniency to send it, the President telling us he long since wrot you about it.

What apparent damage the farmers of the bounds sustained by the troubles ought to be arbitrated according as its mention'd in y<sup>e</sup>: Cowle from w<sup>ch</sup>: you should not swerve lett it be to the Prejudice or advantage of the Company, for otherwise you will discourage future undertakers.

Wee received the 121 bales by the Sarum and the 70 belonging to our Merchants, the latter you did not take the Care you ought to have done in Packing, being very much mildewd so that, had they not been presently putt to washing they would have been rotten, w<sup>ch</sup>: pray by yo<sup>r</sup>: Care prevent for the future.

Wee desire you to hasten to us the copys of those books wee formerly wrot to you for, which may be soon done, there being young men on board y<sup>e</sup>: Loyall Cooke for that Purpose.

Since you advise that the Present method of Collecting the Revenues of beetle and Tobacco is easy to the People and would have been advantageous to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: as farming [had] not the troubles prevented itt, which would have been the same to any that had rented it for which the Comp<sup>a</sup>: must have abated, so that wee think itt adviseable to Collect those revenues [in] one year, in the same method as was directed [when] the President was w<sup>th</sup>: you.

Abdull Labby wee hear is returned from the Camp, who wee wo<sup>d</sup>: not have you Present till the arrivall of M<sup>r</sup>: Roberts, and if what wee hear be true wee cant but blame Mockdum Nino, who [he] said has Promised Abdull Labby 2000 Rup<sup>s</sup>: as a present from your Place, who ought not to be permitted to talk or write about the Government w<sup>th</sup>: out yo<sup>r</sup>: leave.

Wee have sent you what Timbers Procurable on the Loyall Cooke, one Candy of Wax Gunnys &c<sup>t</sup>: Packing stuff.

The Iron screws had been long since sent you, but that wee stand still for want of Europe steell, with which wee hope wee shall be supply'd by the ships wee hourly Expect as also w<sup>th</sup>: Cloath that shall be sent for coats for the souldiers.

Guilt Paper is very scarce here which as soon as Procurable shall send you some.

The Chubdars refusing here also to leave their Dusticks, wee took Copys thereof attested by the Codjee, one of which wee have deliver'd M<sup>r</sup>: Roberts.

The list of what you want has been show'd us by M<sup>r</sup>: Roberts, which has been supplyd as far as wee are able, and comes to you on the ship w<sup>th</sup>: him.

Wee desire you to hasten yo<sup>r</sup>: merchants in finishing their old Contract, that so they may be in a readiness to make a new one on the arrivall of the Loyall Cooke, and give us what assistance, they can to fill up the two September ships, and help us w<sup>th</sup>: a good number of bales for the January Ship.

Wee observe what you write about one of the French ships being gone to the southward, (and wish you could Inform yourself of the certainty of their design) and the great preparation they are makeing for building [such] a Fort as you describe, which certainly will [ . . . ] tend very much to our Prejudice, and may [justly] be feared itt may bring down an order again to stop our Trade, or an Army to Endeavour our Extirpation.

Wee commend the manner of letting out your bounds, in contoning it to sev<sup>al</sup>: Persons which is a great security to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: then trusting so great a yearly revenue in one mans hands.

Wee desire you to make preparation for the speedy unloading the Loyall Cooke so she may return hither w<sup>th</sup>: all Exped[ition].

Yesterday wee received a Letter from Metchlepatam containing very unhappy News, Copy of w<sup>ch</sup>: comes Inclosed to w<sup>ch</sup>: wee refer you.
