SCHOOL OF COMMERCE

The results of the Typewriting Examination are not yet published and we are therefore unable to give a list of the candidates who have passed in the Government Technical examinations held in April last. We hope to do so in the next issue of our bulletin.

Beach Meetings.—The usual series of meetings on the beach for students was held this year in front of the Presidency College on three evenings at 5-30 p.m. from Friday, the 27th of August. The general subject of the series was "The Service of my Country," about which, on the first day, Mr. Chakkarai spoke of "Christ as One's Ideal;" on the second day Mr. Chenchiah spoke of "Christ as One's Message," and on the last day Rev. Mr. Neill spoke of "Christ as One's Inspiration." The few words of introduction and conclusion every day by the Rev. Mr. Leith, who was acting as Chairman throughout the course, were also very helpful towards

making the addresses effective and impressive.

The very good attendance of quiet and careful listeners on all the days especially on the last is a matter for much thanksgiving. The general subject of the series, the addresses delivered, the impressions made on minds of various sorts and conditions of men, the results which might follow, are all matter for serious and prayerful reflection and heart-searching for everyone desirous of our country finding Him who can satisfy all her needs best.

The Student Camp. The Pallaveram Student Camp is to be held from the 23rd to the 27th of September. The general subject of the meetings is "The Christian Student in Daily Life." The following leaders will be present and give addresses or lead Bible circles:—Messrs. L. P. Larsen, J. Bittmann, F. W. Henderson, K. C. Macartney, S. J. Crawford, C. Kingsley-Williams, T. V. Witter, P. Chenchiah, V. Chakkarai, J. E. Neill and E. C. Worman. According to a resolution passed at the last Camp an Interim Committee is responsible for the arrangements this year.

We earnestly invite all Christian students in the city to consider seriously the importance of such gatherings for the attainment of the highest type of life and also request all who believe in the efficacy of prayer and intercession to remember, before the Throne of Grace, the speakers and other leaders, the delegates and those responsible for the arrangements of the Camp.

Christ was proclaimed. Two hill-top meetings—a special feature of the Pallavaram Camp—were held this year. In the first meeting, Mr. Kingsley-Williams gave an idea of the British Student Movement and pointed out the large place which the Morning Watch has in the life of the Movement. On the last day, Mr. Larsen spoke on the need of the world and the duty of the Christian student from the analogy of the call of Isaiah. This was followed by solemn intercession on behalf of the issues raised by the War; the Litany used for this purpose was found specially helpful.

And now the camp has ended and the delegates have returned home to the daily round of duties. The question which one naturally asks is: After the Conference what? Every one of the delegates will certainly recognize "the duty of making the past a success." The inspiration received at Pallavaram is only the beginning of the Christ-indwelling life in the college, in the home and in the community. And it is by this that the camp must be judged—not by the number of delegates, nor by the colleges represented, not by the stir of the days themselves but by the things that abide.

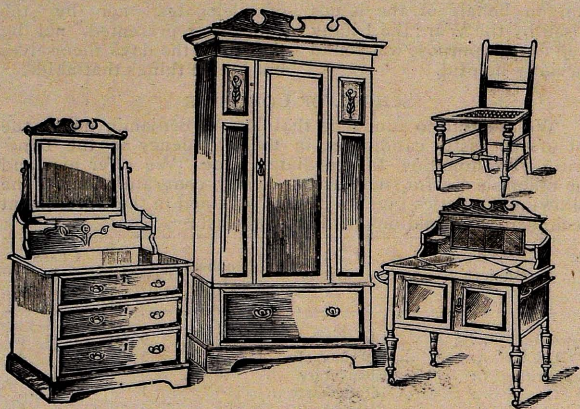
